## The Color of the Leaves

What a beautifully green summer we've had! Warm, sunny days combined with frequent rains have given us green surroundings practically all summer long. During October, we'll be seeing the colors of autumn beginning to develop; beautiful shades of gold, red, and orange. While I love the season and colors of autumn, I am reminded that we see those colors because something goes missing. In the long hours of sunlight, the warm days of summer, and the bounteous rains, chlorophyll has given all of the leaves their various shades of green. With the shortening of days, the chlorophyll is no longer added to the leaves, and their underlying colors become evident. Eventually, the leaves fall away from the trees and other plants, turn some shade of brown, and lie on the ground to decompose.

We flourish like green leaves when we receive all of the benefits that God offers Christian disciples. We receive light and warmth from the Son/sun, we take in the air/Spirit, we draw up the waters of salvation. Without accepting the nurturing gifts of God, we might shine briefly like leaves on an autumn day, but we soon lose our vibrancy, die spiritually, and fall to the ground like a leaf in winter.

While there is a degree of uniformity in the green of

summer and sameness of purpose in chlorophyll, there still is found great variety in the plant world. During a summer walk in the woods, we might find ferns and oaks, fruit-bearing plants and nut-bearing trees, vines that take support from other plants, and flower stems that stand on their own. Leaves may be broad or narrow, plain or variegated, simple or compound, nearly transparent, or leathery thick. And so it is with disciples following Jesus. There is found in the Body of Christ a great and wonderful variety, but also sameness and uniformity in many respects – especially that of having life rather than falling away from the source of life.

How amazing it is to look at a place like the islands of Hawaii and think that, through chlorophyll and photosynthesis, water, and air, every bit of lush vegetation growing there is taking root on a spot that was once bare volcanic rock. Seeds, spores, rhizomes, and tubers find the smallest crack, hole, or indentation in the rock and begin to set out roots that, over time, break up the rock into smaller and smaller pieces until it becomes sand and soil.

Followers of Jesus Christ, taking in and using all the gifts and benefits of the Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer, can take root to bring abundant life to the most lifeless places, persons, and situations to create a lush environment of spiritual development. But we must accept those gifts, take them in, and allow them to do their work within us. If we fail to develop the gifts granted in such great abundance, we become like lifeless deserts or deserted islands, bare and lifeless.

Enjoy these changing days with shifting weather patterns, and take in the beauty of the autumn leaves, but do not let your spirit lose its fruitfulness to a season of spiritual winter and death. We were made for constant and eternal abundance through faith, with hope and love. We must claim it, in Jesus' holy name.

And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent.

### **Trustees' Update**

- +Plans and architecture have changed for the building of the ADA (handicapped) bathroom for the PH (Parish House). The existing two bathrooms on the main floor will be converted into a unisex, handicapped bathroom(s?). This will save us considerable money and also not take space away from the kitchen serving area or require extensive asbestos abatement.
- +New asbestos testing will be done for one wall in the PH and hopeful permits will be granted soon by the building dept.
- +purchasing of a new air conditioning system for the sanctuary is underway. Hopeful it will be ready by the spring of 2025.
- +Power washing of the front and rear of the PH was completed. Also poison ivy was removed and shrubs were trimmed.
- +carpeting in the sanctuary, conference center, hallways, and offices will be cleaned soon.
- +Preparation for the Christmas bazaar is underway thanks to the leadership of Ed Ranieri Jr.
- + The very large tree, which many people feel is obstructing the whole right side of the church is being considered to be removed and possibly replaced by a smaller tree that would be easily decorated for the Christmas holidays. Parishioners are urged to let us know your opinion on this matter.
